

Interstate Pollution Abatement

- Clean Air Act Section 126 prohibits states from transporting pollution that significantly affects the ability of another state to achieve compliance with federal clean air standard.
- EPA has developed several regulations to reduce interstate transport of pollutants especially NOx and SO2.
 - NOx SIP Call
 - CAIR
 - CSAPR
- Developed as cap and trade programs










Interstate Pollution Abatement

- CAIR was important because addressed both NOx and SO2
- Provide reductions to lower concentrations of both ozone and PM2.5
- Unrestricted trading in CAIR did not provide reductions with geographic certainty
- Litigation
 - CAIR remanded to EPA
 - Superceded by CSAPR








Interstate Transport Rules

Clean Air Interstate Rule - CAIR

- Federal Program Fossil fuel fired EGUs
- Present in COMAR 26.11.28
- Annual NO_x, Ozone Season NO_x, Annual SO₂
- Expired December 31, 2014

Healthy Air Act - HAA

- Maryland Program COMAR 26.11.27
- Coal fired EGUs
- Annual NO_x, Ozone Season NO_x, Annual SO₂, Annual Mercury



Cross State Air Pollution Rule - CSAPR

- Effective January 1, 2015
- Federal Program Fossil fuel fired EGUs
- Annual NO_x, Ozone Season NO_x, Annual SO₂





Clean Air Interstate Rule

Proposed as federal regulation
 2004 and final in 2007

COMAR 26.11 28 Clean Air Interstate Rule

- Finalized by MDE in 2007.
- Included NO_x Annual, SO₂
 Annual and NO_x Ozone Season
 Trading Programs.








Transport Rule - TR

- Commonly referred to as Cross State Air Pollution Rule, or CSAPR.
- CSAPR is the court ordered replacement for CAIR.
- CSAPR developed to reduce interstate transport of PM2.5 and Ozone through the reduction of SO₂ and NO_x.
- Originally scheduled to be implemented on January 1, 2012 to replace CAIR.
- In fact became effective on January 1, 2015 through a Federal Implementation Program.





MDE Regulation Amendments



- Repeal COMAR 26.11.28
 - Replaced by CSAPR, 40 CFR 97,
 Subparts AAAAA, BBBBB and CCCCC
- Amend COMAR 26.11.01.01B(24-1)
 "NOx Ozone Season Allowance"
 - Remove reference to CAIR
- Amend COMAR 26.11.14.07C(1)
 - Remove reference to COMAR 26.11.28
- Amend COMAR 26.11.14.07D(1)(a)
 - Remove 'certified', per the request of the EPA, to make clear that CEMs must meet all the requirements of 40 CFR 75, Subpart H
